## FRANK GOES DOWN UNDER

*Members may recall that last Spring Frank Keenan visited Southern Australia for a few weeks ostensibly for "work" reasons! Here he kindly gives us an insight to what went on...*



For ten years Kevin Nunan was the Head of English at STM and three years ago he returned to his native Australia. He applied for a teaching job at St. Bernard's College (SBC) in Melbourne and the Head of the School, Frank Fitzgerald, rang me for a reference. Frank and I got talking about a possible exchange arrangement between our two schools and eventually agreed to swap jobs in Spring 2004. Frank came to the U.K. in Autumn 2003 and spent some time here at St. Thomas More. Just as we were about to begin our job swap in April of last year, Frank rang me to say that, due to family problems, he would be unable to come to England but insisted that my arrangements should go ahead as planned. Accordingly, at 5.30am one Saturday morning at the end of March 2004, Christine and I landed at Melbourne Airport and were met by Frank Fitzgerald. He immediately whisked us off for a four-hour tour of his school, which he clearly loves even more, if that were

possible, than we love ours. The following morning, Frank and his wife and four children set off on a two-month trailer tent tour of Northern Australia, a trip which we were able to follow on his computer screen in his house (we were due to exchange houses and cars anyway) as he sent photos and stories back on a daily basis. We felt that we had travelled round Australia with him.

We spent the Easter holidays in Melbourne and the surrounding countryside. We learned quickly that the huge rift in the Catholic Church in Australia between Conservatives and Liberals would be a theme of our stay. Australia has a huge Catholic population (about one third), large concentrations of which are in Melbourne and Sydney. We were surprised by the cosmopolitan mix of nationalities in the big cities. I then began my term in St. Bernard's College, as a sort of Associate Headteacher. The school is the same as ours but also different. They have 1200 boys aged 11-18. I found it a very friendly and Catholic school. It is considerably older than St. Thomas More, which means that their old boys are even older than ours!

SBC has a huge sporting reputation, they are one of the top schools at AFL (Aussie Rules Football). This is a mad and violent cross between rugby and soccer, played on a vast oval pitch between two teams of eighteen players. It is a very exciting



game and I was lucky enough to be taken to one of the top professional games in Melbourne while I was there. SBC has gone through a phase of rapid expansion and an even bigger building programme than we have had at St. Thomas More. They also cater for a larger mix of nationalities than we do and I was delighted to find a large Italian contingent with Italian being a popular subject on the timetable.

I fully enjoyed my time in the school and visited several other schools in



the Melbourne area, as well as some Catholic Secondary Schools in Sydney where we spent a week as guests of the Catholic Education Office of the Sydney Archdiocese. Comparisons between the different kinds of schools within Australia, and then with our schools back in the U.K., were endlessly fascinating.

We did also manage to see a little bit of Melbourne and Sydney and the State of Victoria. As mentioned above, we were very struck by the cosmopolitan feel of Melbourne in particular, and I was delighted to see that the European influence was very strong in their wine

industry which I managed to visit on a couple of occasions. We were also very struck by the strong sense of history in the cities of Melbourne and Sydney. It took us a while to realise that the Australians are actually very keen to talk about their origins and we had many interesting conversations with people whose ancestors had committed crimes, often of a ridiculously petty nature, in England and Ireland. One of the proudest boasts of modern Australians is to be able to say that they are descended from a "first fleeter" (i.e. someone who arrived on one of the first boats).

For me, it was a great trip and I am delighted that the exchange we have set up is flourishing. We have had one of SBC's teachers working at our school this year, and we are sending two of our teachers out there next year. We have a second Australian teacher arriving here in September. We are planning a pupil exchange trip in August of 2006. As many of you will know, I set up the Dijon Exchange in 1973 and I am pleased that it is still going strong. I hope very much that this initiative with Melbourne will follow the same pattern.

They are a tremendous credit to the school and to themselves; I hope that does not sound too patronising, it's not meant to be that but rather an honest reflection on our school in 2005, of which we can all feel proud.

We are all aware that the headmaster retires at the end of this term. He has been an enormous influence in the Old Boys' Association and without his support and encouragement it is debatable whether our Association would have got off the ground. We look forward to working with the new headmaster, but are ever mindful of the enormous debt we owe Frank Keenan.

I write this piece as the announcement is made of our new Holy Father. I am sure we all offer him our prayers and thoughts as he embarks on the most demanding role in Christendom.

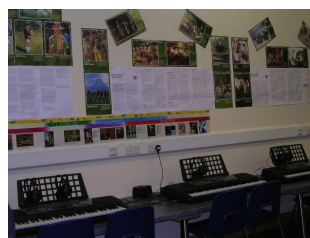


edition of this esteemed publication, this new block houses the music rooms, technology (that's wood and metal work to most of us), additional changing rooms and sports facilities.
