## PAST HEADASTERS EXPOSED!

Friday 22nd June this year saw one of the smallest gathering of Old Boys' ever present for the annual Memorial Mass and Social at the school.

Sadly the numbers present didn't even fill the school chapel (to which the Mass had been moved at the last minute, from our usual venue of the Concourse Area).

However, spirits remained undaunted as our Chaplain, Father Kevin Hale, presided over the liturgy, with Peter Travis reading the Execution Account of St. Thomas More and David Milne on the piano once more accompanying rousing renditions of the school hymn and *For All the Saints*.

As usual the list of deceased Old Boys had increased and was, perhaps, made all the more poignant by the announcement of the death that same day of Elsie Kemp.

After the Mass had ended we all repaired to the School Hall for the traditionally lavish buffet (and it certainly didn't disappoint).

However the formalities this year didn't end immediately since our President, Paul Hutchinson, was able to officially unveil portraits of all five previous headmasters commissioned by the Old Boys' Association.

They are permanently



displayed on the wall in the School Hall and, judging from everyone's comments, bear good likenesses to their subjects.

Frank Keenan, the most recently retired of course, was present as was Helen Wigmore, the companion of the late Don McGregor, who was escorted by Don's son Andrew.

Helen and Don's family had also decided that they wanted to make a permanent memorial to his time as Headmaster (the longest serving so far) and the school were delighted to receive an engraved bench for the Headmaster's Garden.



In presenting the bench Helen made much of Don's fondness for the school and the happy memories that he had of his time at the helm.



The evening continued with the usual eating, drinking and socialising.

## LOOKING FOR FRESH BLOOD

## TWO STALWARTS DEPART

If they had committed murder both David Milne and Clifford Seagrave would have been released from the school many years ago, but with 34 and 35 years service each respectively it must have felt, at times, that they were serving repeat sentences!

However, parole was finally granted in July when these two longest serving members of staff both retired (early, it must be said).

Both had joined the school when it was a small two-form entry establishment with about 300 pupils and no more than a couple of dozen staff.

Computers were the thing of science fiction (and still are in the case of David Milne), with blackboards and Beethoven being the mainstays of their respective departments.

When Clifford started the Concourse Area extension was still to be completed and it opened the following year, when David began his service. At the time the Music department moved into what must have seemed palatial



surroundings at the northern end of the "new block", yet only a few years ago, some 30 or more years later, they moved again into state-of-the-art facilities in the latest extension.

David Milne's History department also moved from its original position in the top floor corner of the Concourse Area to the rooms below previously occupied by the RE department. At the time one wag on the staff commented that the RE department was going to heaven and the history department to hell [was this a comment on the state of teaching? - Ed].

Both of these highly respected members of staff brought to the school more than simply the knowledge of their respective subjects. Clifford, through his championing of the

school choir and music tuition, created a tradition of top quality musicianship across a wide range of instruments and, indeed, a number of Old Boys have gone on to become regular performers with international orchestras.

School concerts became a regular feature of the calendar and were enjoyed over many years by staff, pupils, parents and visitors.

Clifford was always keen to ensure high standards of singing and it could certainly not have been easy to coach, cajole and sometimes force hundreds of adolescent boys to sing hymns with enthusiasm. Yet the volume reached on St. Thomas Day during the singing of the school hymn and *For All The Saints* was often staggering!

David Milne also achieved dizzy heights with his own excursions into the arts.

In his 34 years at the school he produced over 30 school plays covering all manner of genres.

He experimented with productions in the round, involved musical accompaniment on occasion and introduced girls to the cast! His last night speeches were legendary (as were his various attempts to feign reticence to appear on the stage) and some of his stars have even gone on to perform professionally.

So it is with sadness and gratitude that the school said farewell to these two much admired members of staff who will both be hard to replace.

However, all is not lost in as much as Clifford is actually being superceded by the "newer model" as his son (and former pupil) Matt, takes over as Music Teacher. Clifford himself is also continuing on a part-time basis.

We wish both him and David a long and happy retirement.
