PAUL'S MILITARY MEMORIES

Major Paul Rennie, Officer Commanding the Rehabilitation Division of the Defence Medical Rehabilitation Centre - Headley Court, and who left the school in 1986 was Guest of Honour at the recent Alumni Annual Dinner.

Resplendent in his Mess Dress and wearing numerous campaign medals, Paul regaled us with tales of how he came to be in such a lofty and responsible position after receiving an STM education. Leaving the school after completing his 5th Year (Year 11 for younger members) since the 6th Form had yet to be created he went to Welbeck College for two years before joining Sandhurst from which he passed out as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Corps of Signals.

After a number of years in that regiment he resigned his commission and went on a worldwide "walkabout" before returning to education studying a Science Foundation at the Open University and then graduating from Bradford University with a BSc (Hons). He joined the NHS and it was whilst working in this sphere that he began to

hanker once more after the military life and returned to Sandhurst, this time to be commissioned into the Royal Army Medical Corps.

He has since added to his education even further, gaining an MSc from UCL with a speciality in Rehabilitation.

His tours of duty have seen him in Bosnia, Germany, Malawi, Hong Kong, Iraq, Northern Ireland, Afghanistan and Nepal—which he has visited 10 times! He spoke movingly of how the discipline and training of army life helped to keep him sane whilst Camp Bastion was under attack and he couldn't even 'phone his wife back in England to let her know that he was OK.

He paid tribute to the education he received at STM referring to David Milne as one of his heroes [*perhaps he is in training for some sort of military drinking competition—Ed*] and fondly recalled how he, as a big, burly hockey and rugby-playing 5th year had been asked to play a role in the school play as a woman—apparently to great critical acclaim.

He finished his extremely interesting talk by identifying the six key aspects of military life that underpin the philosophy of the British Army: **Loyalty, Integrity, Courage, Discipline, Respect for Others and Selfless Commitment**. Whilst he didn't say as much it's to be hoped that the begin-

nings of those values were sown whilst at STM with its clear Christian ethos and, as if to underline this, he finished by explaining that when visiting a war zone the army's attitude is that *"we're not there to kill everyone, we're there to influence everyone"*.

TOM'S LETTER FROM THE PHILIPPINES

That stirring supporter of the Alumni, Tom Kennedy, heeded the recent plea at the annual dinner for submissions to this esteemed publication and sent the following very interesting account of his brother's life in the Philippines...

A couple of weeks before Christmas 2013 Isobel and I made the two day journey to the Philippines to visit my twin brother Fr. Chris, a Salesian priest, who has been engaged in missionary work there since 1970.

On arrival at Manila airport we were met by a sea of people. Many Filipinos return home for Christmas and they are met at the airport by their whole families and picnic there. Congestion is so great that it takes more than half an hour to exit the car park.

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ON TO GREATER THINGS

Whilst some may see being President as the pinnacle of their achievements (George W Bush, Nicolas Sarkozy and Dmitry Medvedev for example) others seek out even greater things, and so it was that in May last year our very own former President **Paul Hutchinson** (1966) was sworn in as Mayor of Chelmsford!

Chosen to be Mayor from the 57 elected Members of Chelmsford City Council to which he was elected in 2004, Paul moved to Chelmsford in 1974 and for the past 22 years has lived in North Springfield.

He retired in October 2007 and like most retirees finds himself busier, and happier, than ever. As well as the City Council he

has also been a Member of Springfield Parish Council since 2003, is a Trustee of both Chelmer Village Hall and Springfield United Charities, a Vice-President of both Chelmsford Theatre Association and Friends of Hylands House, has served as a Governor of various Chelmsford schools continuously since 1977 and, for the past three years, has been a Judge of the Basildon & Chelmsford Speak Out Challenge.

For three years within all of this he also found the time to be President of this esteemed association!

On his election as Mayor Paul said *"It is a huge honour to be Mayor of the city that has been my home for most of my life. I have seen Chelmsford grow and prosper*

over the past forty years" before making the theme of his year of office: **'Young People - Unleash the Potential'**.

We look forward perhaps, once he has time to breathe again when his year finishes, to hearing tales of his time of exultedness!

Our destination, Don Bosco Makati Technical College, has its own exit from the motorway which reads "DON BOSCO". Fr. Chris is the PP of St. John Bosco parish, a stone's throw away from the College, and resides in the community which serves the College as well as the Parish.

We discovered there are more than 3000 students, one third of whom are given excellent vocational training. The size of the Complex is astonishing. The Salesians have an arrangement with Ford Motor Co., Toyota and Honda whereby students are given mechanical training suited to the companies' needs and this ensures that approx. 1000 student are placed in employment each year. The facilities are first class. More impressive than these is the enormous Printing Press which operates 24/7. All text books, not just for the college but for many other schools are printed here. Religious books, magazines, pamphlets, diaries, calendars, etc. are produced in abun-

dance. Some work is undertaken for local businesses. The parish has a large religious bookshop stocked entirely with religious books and magazines produced in the printing press. Then there is the provincial house which employs a large number of staff in order to deal with the numerous press publications.

Catholicism flourishes in the Philippines. We attended Mass at 4.00am and were astonished to find approx 1800 people in attendance!

Makati is one of seven cities which make up Manila. It is the business centre and has enough high-rise offices and tenement blocks to rival any city. The novel means of public transport is the "Jeepney"-an elongated jeep with a very low roof. Ideal for tiny Filipinos but uncomfortable for Europeans. Traffic is bumper to bumper and the numerous traffic police blow their whistles all day long but nobody seems to take notice. The shopping malls could rival anything we have in the west but only a little way from the main thoroughfare there is abject poverty. St Don Bosco is renowned for his work with poor and abandoned youth and it is heartening that the college gives free board and lodging and an education to 200 boys taken from the streets, each year.

Old Manila was built by the Spanish. Spanish architecture is evident in all buildings. The Cathedral the Bishops House and the Cultural Centre are particularly impressive. Just out-

side the City in Paranakay is the Salesian Seminary, now an international seat of learning. Fr. Chris was Spiritual Director there for many years. Even more impressive, I believe, is the Salesian College in Batalao where Fr Chris spent his first eleven years. We also took a sightseeing trip to Tagatay to view a volcano in the middle of a lake and were amazed by the number of shacks which lined both sides of the road for mile after mile. These are the homes of the migrants from many parts of the Philippines. Here fruit was available in abundance and some of the stalls were forty to fifty metres long. City dwellers drive there to buy their fruit.

Sadly our time flew by but we had seen enough to appreciate the many thousands of islands that make up the Philippines. We had also come to appreciate the friendly and fervent nature of the people. For all the poverty and deprivation they are a wonderfully happy race with a wicked sense of humour. I am proud that my brother was able to minister to them for nearly forty five years.

Sadly his health had been deteriorating since undergoing an operation the previous year and a few months after our visit - on the 12th March 2014 - he passed away. I was able to make a second trip to spend the last week of his life with him. His funeral in the Philippines took place on St. Patrick's Day with 83 priests and 2 bishops presiding. His body was flown back to Ireland for burial in his own parish.

HELPING THE CHILDREN

We employ dedicated Social Workers and Counsellors to deliver a caring service. We emphasize early intervention; our unique approach is to intervene as soon as problems are identified and work with the children for as long as it takes to put things right.

At **bccs**, we see our work as a requirement of faith and are proud of our Catholic foundation; the Bishop of Brentwood is our President and we enjoy much support from local Catholics. The work



we do not only benefit children we work with but also families, the school and local community. We work with children of all faiths and none, but we are still rooted in the Catholic Church.

Over the years **bccs** has been there for thousands of children, and we continue to provide our caring service in St Thomas More. If you or one of your school friends saw a counsellor during your time at school, they may well have been employed and placed there by **bccs**.

So what great things might our current chaplain **Father Daniel Kelly**, himself a past pupil of the school and currently an Assistant Priest in Basildon (perhaps such a posting is some sort of "Rite of Passage"??), expect for the future. Ordained in 2011 and our chaplain since then, I wonder if he looks good in purple or red?
