## BLAST FROM THE PAST

Continuing our series of excerpts taken from the original school log books we enter the second decade of the school's existence...

The decade began with a meeting between Her Majesty's Inspector of Schools and the Headmaster to discuss the school's proposed extension plans [such meetings must now be an almost termly event!]

March 1970 saw the departure of Mr Bunce and in May the Headmaster had cause to address the whole school on skinhead attire. Anyone caught wearing bovver boots would have to spend the day shoeless and skinhead haircuts would result in the culprit having to wear a cap in school. Wrestling at lunchtimes was now also forbidden.

With all of this in mind there is a somewhat sketchy, but incongruous, entry about the introduction of Liberal Studies at this time!

1970 was also the first year that St. Thomas More Day was celebrated on 22<sup>nd</sup> June and the Bishop actually presided.

In July letters of congratulation to J. Friday and P.Lewis from the Royal Life Saving Society were read in assembly. Apparently these two worthy pupils went to the assistance of a young lady in difficulties on Leigh mud flats.

The summer term ended with the departure of Mr Thomas and Mr Syed.

A whole bunch of new staff started in September - Mr Benke (Maths & Physics), Mr Hogg (Geography), Mr Abbott (PE, Games, Biology), Mrs Woods (History) and Mrs Kemp (English).

The school year passed fairly uneventfully. In October interviews by NCO's were held all day for those contemplating a career in the army, and on  $5^{\text{th}}$  March the school closed all day to permit staff discussions on the syllabus for the impending raising of the school leaving age. The year finished in July with A Man For All Seasons being the school play.

The next year began on 7<sup>th</sup> September 1971 with the addition of yet more staff - Mr Jarman (Head of History), Mr Pittard (Metalwork & TD), Mr Barker (Geography), Mrs Donaldson (History, R.E, English) and Mrs Moss (Music).

December saw the boys trounce the staff 9-0 at football and the Christmas term ended with the departure of Mr Hall.

The new term began with the arrival of Mr Boncher on a temporary basis.

A glimpse of the forthcoming industrial strife occurred in February when a power strike resulted in the cancellation of all afterschool activities and a Governors' meeting.

In April interviews were held for candidates seeking admission in September! This was the first time that such a process had taken place and was, apparently, in accordance with the Bishop's request.

Later that month an Old Boys' meeting was held in the hall. Sadly there is no follow-up entry as to how successful this had been.

Despite the beginnings of what might be termed a "recognisably modern" education regime beginning to emerge at the school at this time, it is still comforting to read that the whole school was able to close for the afternoon in May to enable the boys to attend a concert of Carmina Burana at the Royal Albert Hall because 13 boys and 2 staff were performing in it!

The slow march of modernisation continued a few days later when ALL staff were interviewed for their posts in the school re-organisation planned for September 1973.

However traditional gentility returned in June when the Governors took tea with the newlyelected members of the school council.

Sadly on 4<sup>th</sup> July 1972 the entry records the death of Mollie Hillier, the first school secretary, who died after a long illness. The term ended on 20<sup>th</sup> July and marked the last time that boys would be able to leave at the end of the Fourth year due to the raising of the school leaving age.

The new school year saw the arrival of Mr Seagrave (Music) and Mr Kennedy (English, Social Studies, Careers).

Patriotism meant that the school closed for the day in November to mark the Queen's Silver Wedding.

February 1973 saw the inaugural meeting of the Parent's Association and another first was being planned that March when Frank Keenan was absent from school completing arrangements for the Dijon exchange!

The end of the Easter term saw the departure of Mr Abbott and Mr Sharpe.

The school closed for 2 days (was there no end to these "occasional days"? -Ed) in May to allow for the transfer of equipment to, what was then, the recently completed new block!

June and July, being the end of term, seem a strange time for new staff to start, but that's precisely when Mr Bond (P.E & Games) and Mr Michael (Woodwork) began their careers at the school.

The next year would see the first expansion of the school....

## WE GREENE KINGS!



It took a little bit longer this time round, but we eventually returned to the Greene King brewery courtesy of Simon Millyard for our second and final brewery trip for the Association.

The trip did not warrant a minibus as hoped so our Social Secretary became a Southend cabbie for the day and luckily forgot to turn on the meter. If only our treasurer knew!

We arrived at the brewery at 5pm with our ex-membership secretary Paul McArdle, and our current membership secretary avidly checking Gerry's membership with the precision of a taxman. We then had a relaxing wait in the sprightly reception that contained magazines including an article on a front cover featuring Rochford's Anne Boleyn pub!

We were soon joined by Paul Bending and Doug Walters; two members of the same year (1995) who travelled from opposite ends of the country. There was a suspicion as to just how fast Paul had been travelling since he had been caught in a traffic jam not long before he arrived.

Whilst Simon treated us all to a mug of coffee, Martyn Barker (1966), Phil Mahoney (1973) and Simon's Dad arrived on the scene, and just as we were about to start, we were joined by Mick Hawkins (1983), his brother Peter (1985) and Theo Kalogerides (1983) who had all travelled down from Southend too and this made the magnificent 11 and from there the tour began.

We went to the top of the building where the water tanks holding the liquor could be seen (term for water and not the pie/mash equivalent) and enjoyed views of the whole town. We were also guided right through the whole process of the beer production and not one member attempted to dive into the vast liquid surrounds, which is a very good sign of self-control.

We also did our bit for school and country when we were forced with one arm tied behind our back to enter the sampling room where we stayed for a gruesome tasting session. We drank IPA, Ruddles Best, IPA, Ruddles County, IPA, and the rest is purely brain cells.

As true alcoholics, we didn't drink to excess,

merely to capacity, and on leaving the brewery (where the toilets were being mended) we made a bulk dash to the nearest pub for a loo break.

We then made our way to Pizza Express and were told we had to wait 30 minutes for a table. So we briefly took in the Bury air as we made our way to the nearest bar for more drink (including a shot on the house), and ended up in the world's smallest pub.
